

**CITY OF LOS ANGELES \$100,000
“VETERANS MEMORIAL”
AT PUBLIC DOG PARK ON VA PROPERTY**

FACT: The City of Los Angeles has illegally occupied 12 acres of VA property “Rent Free” for a “public dog park” while forcing war-injured and impoverished Veterans to live homeless and hungry at skid row and back-alley squalor.

INSULTING SCAM: • City of Los Angeles: In September 2016, the VA entered into a 3-year revocable license with the City of Los Angeles for the park formerly known as Barrington Park. The City of LA agreed to invest \$350,000 in the park and employment for veterans, to rename the park the Barrington Veterans Park, and to give veterans priority access.



<< Within one year after the Effective Date of the [License] Agreement, work with the USDVA and the local community to design, commission, erect and dedicate a memorial to Veterans (comprising a United States Flag and a plaque dedicating the Veterans' Barrington Park to Veterans) to be located in the Park. RAP shall be responsible for up to a maximum cost of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for this memorial.>>

NOTE: A “memorial” is something to remember the dead. Veterans are alive, but the City of Los Angeles and Los Angeles VA treat them as though they are dead, giving more tribute to dogs than Veterans.

MEMORIAL << Something, especially a structure, established to remind people of a person or event: "a monument built as a memorial to those who fell in the Civil War" intended to commemorate someone or something: "a memorial service in the dead man's honor" >>

Old saying: "We honor our dead Veterans by taking care of our living Veterans."
